THE GATE OF THE YEAR by Minnie Louise Haskins

And I said to the man who stood at the gate of the year:

"Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown."

And he replied:

"Go out into the darkness and put your hand into the Hand of God.

That shall be to you better than light and safer than a known way."

So I went forth, and finding the Hand of God, trod gladly into the night.

And He led me towards the hills and the breaking of day in the lone East.



George VI read this as part of his Christmas address in 1939. Though World War II had started, no one knew what 1940 would bring. Among other things the Battle of Britain would rage in the skies, and rationing would be introduced.

As we stood at the gate of 2020, few of us would have imagined the year we've had. As we stand at the gate of 2021, we are hopeful of a vaccine for Covid-19, but we don't know what the year will bring, personally, nationally or internationally.

The person in the poem who stands at the gate of the year, wants to know what is going to happen – they ask for a light so that they can see. They think this will make them safe. But the gatekeeper advises another option, describing it as a better option – to go out into the darkness, putting their hand into the hand of God. In other words, the gatekeeper asks the enquirer to have faith, to walk with a God they cannot see into an unknown darkness.

As we reach the end of 2020 and prepare to embark on 2021, we might find ourselves wanting to know exactly what the new year holds. Just like in 1939, we may know that there is the potential for darkness ahead especially when we consider not only the pandemic, but the potentially catastrophic challenges of economic uncertainty, the creeping issue of climate change, food security, and the fragility of the ecosystem as

biodiversity declines.

We see the darkness, and want to take control of the situation – demanding a lamp so that we can navigate the year safely by ourselves.

But if 2020 has taught us anything, it's that we as human beings are not in total control. 'Take the hand of God,' the gatekeeper says. Why recommend this course?

God is very familiar with earthly darkness, and in Jesus Christ came into the darkness of this world as a vulnerable baby in the dark streets of Bethlehem. He was intimate with the darkness the world can throw at a human being, and was seemingly overpowered by it in the agony of death by crucifixion.



Knowing that God in Christ understands our darkness is comforting, but does that qualify him as a guide through the dark? All of us face darkness of one sort or another, so what's God got that we don't? It's this: that he is the one who has overcome the darkness by Jesus' resurrection from the darkness of death — and the light of the risen Christ shines inextinguishable. One of our Christmas readings tells us that 'The light shines in the darkness and the darkness has never overcome it.' As we approach the gate of 2021 and face the unknown of the coming year, the gatekeeper's invitation rings out again. Our choice is whether to accept. (by Rev'd Liz — in thoughtful mode)

Middleham author publishes novel

Thelma (who recently celebrated her 100th birthday) Howden's son, Andrew, has just fulfilled a long-term ambition to write and publish a novel, and acknowledges his mother's support in doing so. He explained that Thelma had always encouraged him to write since he was at Middleham Primary School (over 50 years ago) and finally as Thelma reached 100 he has managed to do so!


Andrew describes *Melting in the Middle* as a comic story of 'redemption, second chances - and chocolate.' The central character, Stephen, sees his career heading for the rocks when the chocolate company he works for is taken over by US confectionery giant Schmaltz — and the rest of his life is in turmoil too. Then he meets Rachel, who dances to a very different beat. She challenges him to do good among the carnage that surrounds him. But to do so, he must confront his past and work out all over again what really matters.

When Stephen meets Rachel, she tells him that she is trying to live as a Christian and one element of the book is how Stephen, who hasn't set foot in a church for years, views Rachel's faith and how he experiences being in a church. The story explores themes of redemption and forgiveness, and the seasons of Advent and Lent feature strongly in the narrative.

Andrew adds a 'health warning' that there is plenty of office politics and language which *isn't* remotely 'churchified' as Stephen has a boss who sprinkles swear words and Stephen himself is prone to more than the odd unholy thought! Andrew says 'I absolutely did not want to write some purist tract, but rather to explore if Stephen could rise to the challenge of living a better life in the sometimes grubby world of the office which is his everyday reality.'

The novel already received some good reviews even before publication. Other authors described it as 'brilliantly observed... sharp and clever comedy' and 'funny, poignant and uplifting'.







feeders but now that it is late autumn, they all seem to have disappeared. The food is put out but nothing is eaten.



My view is that it has been a mild autumn and there is a lot of natural food still out in the countryside - berries in hedgerows and insects and other invertebrates in woodland. So that is where the birds are. When that is

exhausted and it gets colder I believe, and certainly hope, that they will return to our gardens.

Pick it up, please!

If you have been walking around Middleham recently, you may have seen one or two new dog poo bag dispensers with some artwork created by pupils at our local schools (Middleham & Spennithorne).

Here are councillors Nigel Hopper and Honor Byford at the sports ground – with their exceedingly well behaved dogs – next to the one at the sports field.

There are lots of reasons why it's important to pick up dog poo:

- It looks awful, and if you've ever stood in it you'll know it STINKS.
- Elderly, disabled, and people with buggies might inadvertently step in it, or get it on wheels or walking sticks
- It's toxic. Due to the microbes, parasites, worms, bacteria etc in dog poo, it can cause blindness (so it's an extra big no-no anywhere children might be playing / sport is taking place)
- The same microbes etc can make other pets seriously ill
- Dog poo contaminates water supplies
- Farm animals and wildlife can also pick up parasites and worms from dog faeces (which can take up to a year to break down). It can lead to the death of sheep, and to both sheep and cattle aborting their lambs/ calves.



So as the sign says, please 'Pick up after your dog.' Even in the countryside where we may be tempted to leave it or flick it.



Someone, or some creature, somewhere will thank you for it.

Covid 19 Vaccine – volunteer clinicians and stewards wanted:

A message from Rev'd Stephen Hanscombe, vicar of Leyburn and Bellerby: I have received a request from Cllr Ian Woods from Richmond Town Council about the administration of the Covid-19 vaccine. This is the message:

'With the announcement of the vaccine success and the mass vaccination campaign which will be needed to be done, there is a need to gather together an 'army' of retired clinicians to help with the programme.

It is more or less certain that the initial site for Richmondshire will be Tennants of Leyburn and they will be operating each day from 08.00 hrs - 20.00 hrs.

As well as clinicians, there will more than likely be a need for volunteers to help facilitate pedestrian flows, parking and other miscellaneous duties. Last night I put out a second call to the Richmond support group and already have 25 volunteers who want to put their names forward.

They will be looking for:

- a) any retired clinicians who could volunteer to administer vaccines (up to date training will be given)
- b) people who would be willing to steward / marshall

I am now linked into the Heartbeat planners so probably best if you ask anyone who is interested to email me with their contact details ian.woods@thornton-le-moor.co.uk (for any clinicians a mobile number would be helpful as they will be put on to a special Whatsapp group) and I will compile the lists and send them off to Heartbeat.'

Hospital Transport – there are new arrangments to medical facilities and hospitals:

~ Parish support groups may be able to provide transport to local medical and dental practices (different parts of the local area have their own arrangements. In Middleham contact David Keep 07531580499 oroffice@middlehamtowncouncil.co.uk in the first instance



~If you have an appointment at one of the hospitals for our district, and no family or friends are available to help, you will be asked to contact PTS (Patients Transport Service) which is provided by Yorkshire Air Ambulance (0300 3302000 between 8am – 6pm). They accept the most critically ill people within the following criteria: outpatients; admission or discharge from hospital; regular life-saving treatment e.g. dialysis, chemotherapy. PTS are reluctant to speak to anyone but the patient who must have appointment details when they phone. PTS is free of charge.

~If none of the above is possible, contact the Leyburn Hub on 01969 624510 or admin@leyburnartscentre.com The Hub has arranged to provide transport via NYCC Transport Service run by volunteers, but is not free of charge. For journeys up to 44 miles, the charge is 45p a mile. For journeys more than 44 miles, the charge is capped at £20. Pay the driver by cash or cheque at the end of the journey.





The last term has been far from normal, with the pressure on staff and students to maintain distancing and the ever-increasing cleaning regime is relentless. Thankfully our cases have been few, but the impact of even half a dozen cases on the rest of our school and wider community has been significant.

As I write we are closed to years 7,8 and 9, who have been returned to online learning for 2 weeks, whilst we contend with significant staff shortages due to the need for self-isolation. Furthermore, we have only had 2 linked cases, so Covid-19 is largely being transmitted into our setting from elsewhere. Everyone is doing their best, but this is not education as we know it.





Does the Church of England have a magic money tree?

Following a discussion with Church leaders about Church finances, I was asked to write an article for Bridge to provide some clarity to the subject. It was thought that because they support Church fundraising activities the wider community might also be interested.

When you see occasional media headlines about the £8.7 billion investment portfolio that the Church Commissioners manage it can look like there is a money tree. However, this portfolio is an endowment. Therefore, there are restrictions



on usage and its purpose is to financially support the Church both now and for future generations. If the capital was spent today there would be less for the future. Church leaders are advised annually by professional actuaries how much can be spent each year and at the same time maintain sustainability for future generations.

What happens to the £170 million income generated from investments? Approximately half goes towards pre 1998 pension deficit, approximately a quarter goes towards bishops' ministry and cathedral costs and the remaining approximately a quarter goes towards supporting different Dioceses and contributing towards outreach. The Leeds Diocese of which we are a part also has an enormous budget - £23 million in 2020. Again, such a vast budget might make us think of the money tree again. But it's a large organisation, 460 parishes, 656 churches and 240 schools spread over an area of 2,425 square miles and inhabited by 2.6 million people. The primary sources of the income in the budget are approximately £14 million from parishes, £5 million from the Church Commissioners and £4 million from charitable and other activities.

How does Leeds Diocese spend this money? The main expenditure is £12.4 million on clergy stipends, £3.4 million to maintain the 450 clergy houses including council tax and water rates, £2.2 million goes towards supporting the 240 Church of England schools in the Diocese, and parish support e.g. safeguarding, buildings and HR; £1.9 million goes towards training e.g. candidates for ordination, clergy courses and support for outreach projects. Only £1.3 million goes on things like governance, finance, ICT. We can see that all the money that parishes contribute (and a bit more) pays for clergy stipends and housing. https://www.leeds.anglican.org/annual-report/2018 The report for 2019 has been delayed. Due to Covid19 the meetings to approve the report have only relatively recently taken place.

Bringing it down to the local level. The cost to run each parish, including ours, using approximate figures, is £58,000. This breaks down to £27,000, the stipend which Liz and I share, £2,000 National Insurance, £9,000 pension (this doesn't go into our private pension pot – it's a general clergy pension pot and includes contributing to historic deficit), £10,000 housing and £10,000 towards the stipends and housing of curates and archdeacons. The Diocese has a calculation to work out how much of this it requests from each parish. The Diocese has asked our parish for £37,000 towards our parish costs. Therefore, we're subsidised by other parishes in the Diocese (for example, parishes like Bedale which pays over £70,000 to the Diocese, much more than its costs). On top of what the parish pays to the Diocese, the parish also has overheads and building maintenance costs, plus utilities, to be paid along with other church activity.

I hope that people will see that we benefit from the shared cost system by being significantly subsidised in addition to other support that we receive from the Diocese. Plus, there are other areas in which we benefit as a community from the Diocese e.g. schools, and that the Diocesan administration costs are a small portion of the budget.

Finally, I would like to say thank you to everyone who contributes to the life of the Church in many different ways. I hope that this article has gone some way in demystifying Church of England finances. Alas, there is no magic money tree.
