From the Town Clerk

Many of you will have noticed vehicle tracks heading in all directions across the Low Moor which have badly churned the grass surface this past winter. The Town Council leases the Moors to the Middleham Trainers Association (MTA), through which it has reminded trainers that they and their staff do not have a general right to drive where they please. As a practical necessity, however, Council recognises that trainers need to supervise training safely and effectively, and consents to limited, essential vehicle access. This is on the understanding that, wherever possible, they adhere to the established tracks, show consideration to all other users and do not damage the turf, particularly during wet weather. Council has a good relationship with trainers, with whom it is currently developing a 'management plan' to manage the moors, preserve the appearance and beauty of the natural environment and wildlife. When the

weather improves MTA plan to reinstate and repair the surface.

As well as trainers' vehicles, it is apparent that residents and vehicles from further afield have also been accessing the Moor, particularly above and around Pinkers Pond where the grass beyond the parking area is very badly churned; some tracks have become ponds in their own right. One vehicle even appears to have attempted a circumnavigation of the Pond, creating a very muddy scene, damaged vegetation and ruining the path.

As with all other areas of Common Land, there is an historical and legal restriction on vehicle access across the Moors. You may drive up to 15 metres from the highway in order to park, but no further and for no other purpose. Please note that the various tracks and horsewalks across the Moors are not public rights of way, whether as short cuts or scenic routes to enjoy the view. The footpaths and bridleways are clearly marked on the notice boards at the entries to the moor and on our website:

middlehamtowncouncil.co.uk The police have authority to stop vehicles on the Moors and they do patrol these areas.

The Countryside and Rights of Way Act 2000 (CROW Act) normally gives public rights of access to 'open country' (mountain, moor, heath and down) or registered common

land, but in some cases there are local restrictions. The Middleham Low and High Moors have a registered right for racehorse training, established many years ago, meaning that the gallops are not 'open access land' during training hours (daybreak until 1pm, 365 days of the year). Before 1pm, the public must keep to the designated public rights of way (footpaths and bridleways), with dogs under close control and even then, please take care when crossing the gallops as horses may approach at speed. Horses can also over-react to walkers and dogs, which may endanger the rider so we ask you always to keep a wide berth.

After 1pm you have an unrestricted right to roam across High and Low Moor. Dogs must be kept on a short lead (no longer than 2 metres) between 1st March and 31st July to protect ground nesting birds – this is a national law on all open access land. We have important populations of curlews, lapwings and skylarks nesting here. There are no other significant rules, other than a prohibition on shooting which may only be undertaken by MTA to control pests and vermin. The Moor is used throughout the year by, in addition to the trainers, walkers, dog owners, horse riders, bird spotters, the radio control flying club and many others. It is a wonderful amenity on our doorstep and

everyone is welcome to share the experience. Hopefully, this short summary can help everyone enjoy the Moors safely and maintain them and the wildlife they support in good condition for everyone's benefit.


