

Letter From the Rectory – Mending Relationships - Rev'd Jeff



Between 1983 and 1985 there was a historical drama showing on television called 'By the Sword Divided' which you may remember. It was set in the English civil war and told the story of the fictitious Lacey family who were torn apart by their conflicting views, some being Royalists and others being Parliamentarians. It sticks in my mind because it had never crossed my mind as a teenager that a family could be so divided and hostile against each other.

In more recent public discourse families have found themselves similarly divided but thankfully without violence. I wonder if families have had a chance to heal and to put their differences aside or whether they continue to lurk not far below the surface? There has been talk of attempts to heal the rifts in society but I'm not sure if much progress has been made. There are factions that profit from division and chaos in society so healing the divisions will be very difficult. This takes place largely online where information is sent with the intention of inflaming anger, entrenching views and pitting people against different groups in society.

The Church is a family and occasionally finds itself divided on issues, notably sexuality in recent years. Therefore, the Church of England has produced a course which we shall be doing this year for our Lent Course called Pastoral Principles for Living Well Together. The course seeks to give us principles by which we can address six issues which cause division among people. The issues we will seek to address are ignorance, power, fear, prejudice, silence and hypocrisy. The purpose is to examine our lives afresh, as is traditional in Lent, and learn together so that we are better prepared for when we encounter difference and diversity. These issues hinder our growth as Christians, hurt others and create barriers between people.

The sessions will be held in Middleham Church Tower Room on Tuesday afternoons at 1:30pm starting on 8th March. We do hope that you can join us as we build bridges with others.

Also in March are our Mothering Sunday Services on 27th March which are wonderful opportunities to thank God for our mothers and important mother figures in our lives, and to pray for them. Please see later in Bridge for the details.

But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, Meekness, temperance: against such there is no law.



Elizabeth Barnett Charity, East Witton

Elizabeth Barnett was a clergyman's wife who left money in her will dated 1765 for the education of the children of East Witton. The current trustees of the Elizabeth Barnett Charity award income from investments to benefit the schools attended by children from the parish, but also for the education, including social and physical training, of children or young people under the age of 25 who are resident in the parish of East Witton.

The trustees normally meet twice per year and welcome applications from individuals or groups. If you run a group or club which benefits children from the village, or if any child or young person from the village has the chance to go on an educational trip, or needs help with the cost of education or training in its widest sense, you may wish to apply to the trustees for a contribution.







Lent Course: Pastoral Principles for living and learning well together

This Church of England course is to help church communities to examine afresh their life and learning together in the face of difference and diversity. Although the Pastoral Principles were developed to encourage better inclusion of LGBTI+ people, they can be



applied to other differences within our church communities.

In this course, we are invited to think about the things which impair relationships. The Pastoral Principles identify six 'pervading evils': prejudice, silence, ignorance, fear, hypocrisy and power, which hinder our personal growth as Christians, hurt other people, and create barriers that stop our

churches from growing into Christian communities of welcome and belonging. They are the opposite of the fruit of the Spirit. It is easy to see these 'evils' in others; the hard work is to see them within ourselves.

When there are strongly held differences among us, we are tempted to form like-minded groups or factions. Communities that become divided in this way is one of the greatest challenges for our Church and society today. We can all play a part in seeking unity in our Church as well as in the wider community. This course encourages us to find creative ways to grow and learn together in the love of Christ.

The course will be on Tuesdays, 1.30pm – 3pm at St Alkelda's, Middleham on the following dates: 8, 15, 22, 29 March and 5 April.

Biodiversity in our parish



The snowdrops in Middleham churchyard have been looking glorious. Snowdrops are also known as 'Candlemas bells' because traditionally they flowered around the Christian festival of Candlemas, 2 February. They are not a native plant, but in the last few centuries they have been recognised as one of the first signs of Spring. Recently, however, there have been reports of even earlier flowering – December, and even November.

Because they flower early, snowdrops do not rely on pollinators, though on a particularly warm winter's day they may be visited by insects.

In days gone by, snowdrops were used to treat headaches and as a painkiller. Apparently, there is a compound in the bulb which has been used to develop a dementia treatment. But beware – the bulbs are poisonous if eaten.

"Don't Look Up": Or Perhaps We Should

Over Christmas and New Year I had time to enjoy watching a film or three (or four ...). The one that remains with me bears the title that appears at the top of this article, "Don't Look Up", and can be viewed on Netflix, should you have access to that. At first glance, it appears to be a standard disaster movie: two scientists discover a comet that is on a direct collision course with earth and yet their warnings are ignored, despite the fact that the comet is so large that impact would constitute an 'Extinction level event'.

I didn't realise as I started viewing that the film had

been deliberately produced as a satire on why it is that we are being so slow to respond to the existential threats of climate change and the ecological emergency. It is, without doubt, a very funny film in places. (Hang on in there for a bit of poetic justice meted out to the American President as the credits roll.) Yet it also conveys a message: we ignore the climate science at our peril, & we do that because we find the facts to be inconvenient, uncomfortable, even threatening, so we would rather not 'look up' & see what's coming.

Here is a little glimpse for you of some of the reasons the characters in the film don't take the scientists seriously:

- The American President is firstly distracted by a sex scandal, then decides to take time to assess matters since the likelihood of impact is 'only' 99.78%. She then moves on to worry about the impact (no pun intended) that releasing the news might have on mid-term election results.
- When the scientists decide to take the story to the media, it isn't given the airtime it merits as there are other stories that people would prefer to hear, like celebrity gossip.
- Then the economy comes into play! The world's 3rd richest man an IT developer realises that there will be precious metals on the comet that he can utilise and profit from. So the film moves on to a 'technology will save us and we can make money out of this' trajectory (again, no pun intended), with plans to blast the comet into smaller pieces and bring them safely to earth.
- The people of the world are divided. Some want the comet totally destroyed, others accuse the powers that be of alarmism, and yet others say the whole thing is a hoax.

Does any of this sound familiar? I won't spoil the film by telling you how it ends, but it is worth watching. I came away from it with a fresh realisation of just how important it is that we try to get the 'messaging' right about the realities of climate change. It may be that it is a message that some would still rather not hear, but the reluctance of some to hear does not free us from the responsibility to speak and – more importantly – to act. One big difference between the plot of the film and the reality of climate change is this: whilst there is little that any individual can do about a comet hurtling towards the earth, there is a great deal that individuals, communities and governments can do in the face of climate change. We still have the chance to mitigate disaster.

Our student press pack has taken some time off to focus on our new online school newspaper. The project has all stemmed from our enrichment offer and students are now busy polishing



and perfecting our online newspaper site. We hope that we will be able to share it externally in the future.

Things are slowly getting back to some sort of normal, however we were only fully staffed this week since Christmas due to covid. After the mock exams Year 11 are now settling into their routine of regular revision and exam preparation. We have split the year group into very small tutor groups of about 6 students and allocated them to our senior leaders and teachers. The senior staff will mentor students 3 times week over the next 3 months to help motivate, calm and inspire the students to plan revision and exam preparation. We have to remember that this is the first time in 2 years that students have sat national exams and they're feeling the pressure. The exam boards have now

released the modifications for 2022, but it can still seem daunting, which is why we have made the decision to mentor them in this way.

We have been able to offer 3 overseas trips this month, which again is a sign that things are returning to normal. Year 7 are looking forward to the week-long trip to France in June, Year 9 and 10 are able to look ahead to a trip to the battlefields in Belgium in September and Berlin in November.

Finally, this week I interviewed students for the position of Senior Student. It is a pleasure to interview young people who have passion and enthusiasm for leadership. In the end Molly Hunter-Year 10 was appointed as Senior Student Leader and Jessica Tattershall-Weaver Yr 11-Deputy Student Leader. Both girls will now become the link between students and the Senior Leadership team, as well as supporting in a range of activates and events in school.

Bird notes from Richard Wells

A short bird notes this month because I am off to the North Norfolk coast for a spot of winter birdwatching in one of my most favourite spots. Lots of geese and hopefully a crane or two.

Mind you, we have not been short of geese ourselves. I counted more than 750 in the fields between Jervaulx and Thornton Steward in mid-February with 5 smaller pink-footed geese among them. Plus a handful of Canada geese. On the same day a great white egret was also in the same area.

It is amazing that this species is now being seen in the area on several months of each year. A decade ago it would not have been in the country, let alone the north of England.

Several of you have reported seeing barn owls during the day, particularly after wet nights which have made their hunting impossible. Three were spotted on one morning between the Cover Bridge and Jervaulx.



Finally, if you are desperately in search of something spring-like, take a walk along the banks of the Ure between the Cover Bridge and Middleham. It is a good place to see a build-up of pre-breeding oystercatcher (below) before they disperse in pairs into the fields of upper Wensleydale. And it has already started. On Feb 14th I saw a flock of 125, which is a large number for so early. The peak record number is 297. Can anyone beat that in 2022?
