

Positive or negative? Rev'd Liz

I've been having a ponder about whether I'm a positive or negative person. This is a result of having a conversation with someone who was telling me that they felt there is so much

negativity in the world now.



To help me along, I did a little quiz online. My results were fairly mediocre. If it was a school report it would say, 'Could do better.'

What about you? Are you naturally positive or negative? Here's an example to get you started: If someone asks you if they can have a chat with you, do you immediately think it will be something to look forward to or not? Of course, it can also depend who is asking!

How do we end up as someone who is predominantly positive or negative? It can be complicated. The messages we receive as we grow up can have an impact, as can particular things that happen to us, or our general life experience. Sometimes,

regardless of circumstances, we just feel 'down' and we can't help it. (We must never downplay the issues of mental health.)

But sometimes we make a decision about whether to be positive or negative. There is a fantastic film called 'Marvellous' starring Toby Jones as the main character, Neil Baldwin, who was diagnosed with having a mild learning disability as a child. During the film, Neil says, "I've always wanted to be happy so I decided to be." Wow.

I think I can learn a lot from Neil. Sometimes I need to make a decision to be happy not sad, positive not negative. We can get into unnecessary spirals of negativity which don't do us or anyone else any good.

So what's the remedy for all this? Jesus suggests a few things that are definitely worth a try:

When you are being negative about someone, try blessing them (either in prayer or just by purposefully looking for the positive in that person).

When you feel hard done by, thank God for all the good things (blessings) in your life. Or if you are not a person of faith, cultivate thankfulness in your life.

When you're afraid of change or the world feels doom-laden, remember God has a plan. He loves the world and won't give up on it. And don't underestimate the role you can play in making the world a better place. It's not too small to count. Neil Baldwin is never impeded by such thoughts. He took it upon himself to greet new students at Keele University and make them feel welcome – and made a big difference to new students with his friendliness.

God is relentlessly positive – always hoping for the best in us, readily forgiving us, never wavering in his love for us. The Bible says we're made in his image – time to give it a go?







Bird notes from Richard Wells



There is nothing that encapsulates for me the sound of summer than swifts. They don't spend long with us – arriving in early May and leaving in mid-August – but they do make a big impact. That can be swooping low over the village green here in East Witton on a coldish morning or screaming in groups as they catch insects on long, warm summer evenings.

We have four or five pairs in the village, nesting in holes under the eaves of our 19th century dwellings. David Lack wrote a book many years ago called Swifts in a Tower, the results of his research on the birds he studied in Oxford. I think it was that which first fired my enthusiasm for swifts.

Masham has an enthusiastic group of people who promote that town's swifts. They have installed cameras in some of the artificial boxes they have erected to encourage swifts to breed. Google 'Masham swifts' or go on Facebook (20+) Save Our Swifts, Masham North

Yorkshire | Facebook and you can see in real time what the swifts are up to, from the laying of the eggs right up to the young taking to the wing. A more inspiring watch than mainstream television at this time of year, I promise.



In other news, two hobbies were seen over Jervaulx Ings in mid-June and what great news that Coverhead Farm has won a conservation award for its work in enhancing habitat for black

grouse. Not so good news – the pair of spotted flycatchers I mentioned last month nest prospecting in our garden didn't hang around for long. I guess they have found a better place to rear young.

Biodiversity in the Churchyard

Elder(Sambucus nigra)

In days gone by, it was said that an elder planted near to your house would keep the devil



away as for some reason the devil feared the elder. It is also known as the 'Judas tree' as there is a story (not in the Bible) that Judas Iscariot hanged himself from an elder tree after he betrayed Jesus. It's common in hedgerows, on railway embankments, and in churchyards.

Elder produces beautiful frothy blossom, and if you are

a forager, you may have been

picking it to make delicious elderflower cordial.

It's also an important source of nectar for a variety of insects,. The flowers then develop small, purple-black, sour berries, which ripen from late-summer to autumn. The berries are eaten by birds and mammals. Small mammals, such as dormice and bank voles, eat both the berries and the flowers.

Many moth caterpillars feed on elder foliage, including the white-spotted pug, swallowtail, buff ermine and dot moth (above right) a



For human consumption, the flowers and berries are the only edible part of the plant. They are mildly toxic though cooking destroys the toxic chemicals.

Other interesting facts:

~It is thought the name elder comes from the Anglo-Saxon 'aeld', which means fire, because the hollow stems were used as bellows to blow air into the middle of a fire.

~Elder wood is hard and yellow-white.

Mature wood is good for whittling and carving, while smaller stems can be hollowed out to make craft items.

~Elder foliage was once used to keep flies away and branches were often hung around dairies.

~Elder is also a great source for a variety of coloured dyes and historically it was used to make lushly patterned Harris Tweed. Blue and purple dye was obtained from the berries, yellow and green from the leaves, and grey and black dye was made from the bark.



Future of Bridge

The Bridge has been a wonderful communication tool for the churches and communities in our parish for many years, containing invaluable local information and a showcase for local events and news stories.

With the pandemic in 2019, a change in format from paper to

email version was the only way the information could continue to be distributed and Liz has worked very hard in editing and circulating the email version to an ever-growing list of community members. Liz decided in April that it was time to step away from this role with effect from the end of the year, and so we are in **NEED OF A NEW EDITOR.**

If you are interested in this (voluntary) role, please contact Liz (details at the end of Bridge) and she will be able to tell you more about what it entails. Briefly, you need to be able to have a PC, be able to use Word or Publisher, have 15 – 20 hours a month available, have a creative eye for layout, and be able to work to a deadline. We will need to hear from you by the end of August so that a transition period can begin in September, with the new editor taking on the role fully from January 2023. Should we be unable to find a new editor, we regret to say that the December2022/ January 2023 issue will be the last edition.

Should an editor come forward, and we are able to continue, we have also been considering the viability of reinstating a hard copy version of the Bridge to be delivered to each household. The costs and logistics of producing Bridge in paper format are enormous and rely on many hours of volunteers' time. Costs of production are rising all the time and volunteers are becoming increasingly hard to come by, so the workload for the handful left is just too onerous. After much research and discussion, it has finally been decided that, if Bridge continues, as from the February 2023 edition, Bridge will be distributed solely in an online version.

We realise that this will come as a blow to those who would prefer to have a hard copy, but we will ensure that the printing facility of the email version is straight forward so that it can easily be printed at home. For those who do not have a printer at home or access to a computer, we would urge to you to ask a friend or neighbour to print it for you.

For those who do have printers we would ask you to please consider printing out a copy for anyone you know who finds accessing technology difficult as some people find it hard to ask. Or if you already print the online version at home, perhaps you could pass it on to someone else after you have finished with it? That way we can spread the task of distributing the Bridge among the whole community. Of course, we don't want anyone to be out of touch and so if you do not have anyone you can ask to help or print it for you, then please do get in touch. (Contact Karen Newsam on 01969 622395)

We thank you for your understanding and cooperation and hope to be producing the Bridge for many more years to come! We would also like to thank the team of volunteers who over years have helped to produce and distribute the paper version and hopefully this vital publication can continue, albeit in a different format.


