### Letter From the Rectory. Ash Wednesday.



On the 22<sup>nd</sup> February Christians celebrate Ash Wednesday.

Ash Wednesday and Lent are an amalgamation of traditions. In Jewish customs well before the time of Jesus people would wear sack-cloth and sit in ashes as a sign of sorrow that they had sinned

against God. Hence the use of ash and the name Ash Wednesday.

At Ash Wednesday services worshippers are offered to receive the mark of the cross in ash on their foreheads. The sign of the cross signifies that the person has been forgiven because of what Christ achieved for us on the cross. Some people prefer to wipe this off before they leave, they are forgiven so the ash is no longer necessary; others prefer to leave it as sign that they are carrying the cross into the world.

The idea of fasting for Lent arose in the 4<sup>th</sup> century when Bishop Alexandria wrote a pastoral letter to those in his care suggesting that they observe 40 days of fasting before Easter resonating with Jesus' 40 days of fasting in the wilderness.

Ash Wednesday is 46 days before Easter. In some regions Sunday was seen as a time of celebration so was not counted in the fast. In other regions the 40 days ended on Palm Sunday, the Sunday before Easter when Jesus triumphantly entered Jerusalem a week before the cross. The final week being a time of stricter denial.

The nature of the fast has changed over time. There was a time when it was very strict. Then the Catholic Church stated that one meal during a 24 hour period was the standard. Nothing was said about the size or the length of the meal! Meat was expected to be fasted from for the whole 40 days. Then Pope Gregory wrote to Augustine of Canterbury in the 7<sup>th</sup> century saying that this should include all dairy products giving rise to our Shrove Tuesday pancake tradition.

Over time the fast has become less strict until we arrived at today's practice of giving up chocolate or alcohol for Lent and refraining from meat on Good Friday and in more recent times it has become more popular to observe Lent 'positively', i.e. doing some good in society.

Therefore, it's safe to conclude that there is no right or wrong way to observe Lent! Above all the point is to do something that helps you draw closer to God that will hopefully develop into a habit beyond Lent.

I wish you well with your Lent observance. We would love to see you at one of our Ash Wednesday services. Please see elsewhere in Bridge for the details of these.

## **Lent Pilgrimages**

This year, instead of running a formal Lent course, we are going to do a weekly pilgrimage, one in each area of the parish, Middleham, Coverdale, East Witton and Thornton Steward. Details are below.

Pilgrimage has become increasingly popular over the last decade or so, with more people

from varied backgrounds taking part.

The British Pilgrimage Trust describes pilgrimage as a 'journey with purpose on foot to holy/wholesome/special places. To turn a walk into a pilgrimage, at the beginning set your private 'intention'. Are you seeking help with something/ want to give thanks for something/ want to ponder something/ or simply connect with nature?'

There will be the opportunity to reflect during the pilgrimages, and there will be one or two reflection questions based on the time Jesus spent in reflection in the desert. Please feel free to join in with these or not.

Pilgrimage is for everyone, connecting you with yourself, others, nature and God. Everyone is warmly welcome whether you are on a 'spiritual journey' or not — as are canine friends.

The pilgrimages will take approximately an hour and a half - from 10.30am - 12 noon or thereabouts. You'll need shoes suitable for walking, and the ability to walk 2 - 3 miles.

Weds 1st March Thornton Steward – meet on Thornton Steward green Weds 8th March East Witton – meet at the bottom of East Witton green Tues 14th March Middleham (date TBC) - meet at Middleham church Weds 22nd March Coverdale – meet outside the Foresters pub.

**Palm Sunday April 2nd** -meet at Middleham castle at 9.20am to walk to East Witton for the Palm Sunday service beginning on the green at 10.30am.

EASTER DAY April 9th —meet at Middleham castle at 9.20am to walk to Pinkers Pond for a Sunrise Service beginning at 6.30am. Followed by tea/coffee and hot cross buns!

The pilgrimages will be led by Rev Jeff or Rev Liz. It is free to come along.

# Dedication of Middleham 'Peal Board' to commemorate fallen bell ringers of WW1

# Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> February 12.30pm

No less than three Middleham bell ringers lost their lives in the First World War and on the centenary of each of their deaths, expert ringers mostly from Yorkshire rang peals in their honour. The last of these peals rung in 2018 was also the first peal rung on the bells after they had been fully restored following very successful bell restoration appeal. A peal comprises over 5000 separate bell changes for each ringer and normal-

ly takes about three hours of continuous ringing so representing a fitting commitment of time, skill and effort by ringers to mark this occasion.

Often churches celebrate a significant ringing event with a peal board on which it is customary to record the names of the ringers and the name of the method which they rang. Despite having such fine bells Middleham does not have a single peal board although it has some minor records of past ringing and it was therefore decided that this ringing effort and why it was rung should be celebrated by our first peal board.

Peal boards are made using traditional signwriting techniques and we were very fortunate to secure the services of a renowned lady who made ours the last one before she retired.

We are therefore going to hold a short **dedication service** for our peal board on **Sunday 12**<sup>th</sup> **February commencing at 12.30 p.m. to be followed by the ringing of another peal** by the same ringers to mark the occasion.

**All would be most welcome** to attend this service and help us dedicate this peal board and remember the ringers it commemorates.



## Are you looking for a volunteer administrative role?

If so, the Church is looking for a new PCC Secretary. This isn't an onerous role, because the PCC only meets 4 times a year, 3 'normal' meetings in January, October and December and an annual meeting in April.

The role involves producing and distributing the agenda before the meetings, producing and distributing the minutes afterwards. For the annual meeting there is the additional task of collating reports written by Church officers into an Annual Report and Accounts. The Secretary needs to be organised, able to make notes and have a good working knowledge of computers. The Secretary will need to comply with Parish's safeguarding and GDPR protocols.

You do not need to be a member of the Church of England to do this role, or to attend church, though a sympathetic view of the church and its role would be helpful.

# Biodiversity in the churchyard:

# The Treecreeper

Walking through Middleham churchyard early in January, one of the church congregation saw a treecreeper in the church yard.

As you can see from the photo, left, treecreepers are motley brown with light streaks and white underparts. Their brown mottled feathers help to camouflage them, so that they blend in with the tree trunks they climb.

They have a white stripe above the eye and a long, thin downward curving beak, designed to pick out insects hiding in the bark. Their stiff tail is used like an extra limb to help brace against vertical trunks. They creep up trees,

looking for food, and at the top of the tree, they will often fly down to the bottom of another tree and begin creeping up the 'new' tree. They might also feed on seeds during the winter months when invertebrates are scarce.

Treecreepers breed in April, wedging their nests of moss, feathers, and grass into a crevice on the tree. They lay 5-6 eggs.

And just in case it ever comes up in a quiz, the collective noun for treecreepers is a 'spiral', so named for their habit of spiralling up a tree trunk as they hunt for insects.

# Climbing Personal Mountains at The Wensleydale School -January 2023

If you ever decide to climb Mount Everest, you'll do it guided by a Sherpa. Sherpas are an indigenous local people that have lived in the Himalayas for thousands of years. Their role is to guide you at each step of the journey, prepare the route, carry your kit, and protect you in risky spots. They are extraordinary.

A lot of us have a tendency to look for a Sherpa-like figure in the rest of our lives: someone who will tell us which way to go, and how to find the correct, right, perfect path.

But it's not possible to live your happiest life if you assign someone else to lead the way. We are all climbing our own mountains, and every single person's mountain is different. No one else can possibly know the path to the summit of anyone else's mountain, because it is the act of climbing that creates the path. No one can lead the way, except you.

This is, for students at the Wensleydale school, the new challenge set down in January 2023. We are encouraging students to start climbing.

We have tasked the students to do one thing that they long to do, are curious about, or that makes them feel alive. Through our extensive enrichment programme we are inviting everyone to try something new: sign language, sailing, animation, gardening, anything that they are curious about.

An assembly by Mr Barnett introduced the concept of their own personal mountains. This is true in academic learning as well as extracurricular activities. How one person revises, learns or is successful in education is very different from another. All students have a different start point and end goal in terms of grades and aspirations, so it is important they work at their own 'mountain' in their own way, towards their end point. In addition we are urging students to stop making comparisons with others.


Imagine, for example, that you climbed Mount Everest and your friend climbed Penhill. Would you compare the time-to-summit against their climb? Of course not. They're completely different mountains! It would be ridiculous. And yet, we do this all the time with other people's mountains, and it has a negative effect on our well-being.

Research has found that using social media tends to promote upward comparison, the comparison to others who seem to be doing better than us. "Their mountain looks pretty great in that picture, doesn't it?" we say to ourselves, not seeing the myriad other challenges that occurred as they climbed. Often students compare themselves against others and social media has not helped this in any way. Upward comparison leads to shame and envy, emotions that harm us. One study found that using Facebook to check on other people's climbs creates beliefs like, "others have better lives than me" and "others are happier than me".

To be successful in our climb, we need to have friends who cheer us on from their own mountains and who we support and celebrate, too. So this term, we are supporting anyone who has the courage to try something new, focus on their 'mountain' and to always remember that the students are in charge of their own expeditions.



# Bird notes from Richard Wells - Feb 23



In my last Bird notes I was bemoaning how low duck numbers were and wondered whether a shortage of water might be a reason. Well, there is no shortage of water now – the Ure has burst its banks on two occasions so far this year and many fields have been flooded. But still duck numbers are low. I did count a flock of 60 teal near Hark-

ersbeck. A half-decent number, but normally I would count 200-300 in the same spot.

A poor breeding season in Northern Europe and Asia? Avian flu? A mild winter in the Baltic Sea meaning there is no cause to travel in search of food to the UK? One or more of these factors may have played a part.

It has not been all doom and gloom. Barn owls have been seen on several occasions at East Witton and along the riverbank between the Coverbridge and Jervaulx. Flocks of

lapwing have been spotted as icy conditions force them to fly in search of food; one over the parishes in mid-January was more than 200-strong and on a personal level I was thrilled to flush a jack snipe on Braithwaite Moor on the last day of 2022. The species is a winter visitor to us, smaller than an ordinary snipe with a shorter beak. It has






a habit of leaving it to the last

possible moment before fleeing approaching feet and doesn't fly very far before settling back among the heather. It certainly doesn't tower into the air like our summer snipe do.

The sighting of the period, however, belongs to Ken Clarkson who enjoys putting
