Letter From the Rectory. Ash Wednesday.

I am slightly claustrophobic and have been horrified by the recent earthquakes in Syria and Turkey. The thought of being trapped is unimaginably horrific, claustrophobic or not, not to mention the unspeakable loss and suffering that the earthquakes have caused.


Who shall we blame for all this? God? The government? The universe? The builders or building

contractors? The tectonic plates? Certainly the latter caused the earthquakes but we can't direct our retribution at them. The universe? Pretty poor of the universe to direct such destruction on innocent people. The government and builders? As one survivor said, 'Earthquakes don't kill people. Buildings kill people. Some of these buildings haven't been built properly.' And when you see the pictures or film footage it is remarkable that some buildings remain upright, while others are a heap of rubble. And what about God? The problem of suffering is a huge sticking point for many people when it comes to God. Why didn't God stop this happening if he is so powerful? Good question. And I'm not sure I know the answer. But I don't believe in a malevolent God who delights in dishing out suffering indiscriminately. Would such an entity be worth believing in? So we are left to puzzle the question. As Christians we refer to the Bible for answers, and there we see other examples of suffering, sometimes with no explanation as to why such things have happened. We can have a stab at rationalising much of the evil in the world – the result of human greed, selfishness, and so on, and we are taught that there are dark forces at work too. But when we come face to face with a 'natural' disaster we can still be left perplexed. How can God possibly understand what we go through, or what the souls in Turkey or Syria have gone through and are going through? And yet, Christ came into a broken world, and in his humanity walked an often painful road.

We are in the period of Lent – a period that takes us to the events of Good Friday, culminating in the execution of Jesus by crucifixion. Death ultimately came to Jesus by suffocation. And so we have a God who does understand our pain and is there in the inexplicable middle of it.

Meanwhile, though we may not understand why these things happen, we can respond to the call for help, and though far away, contribute to the rebuilding of lives and the rekindling of hope.

Verse of the month: He was despised and rejected by others; a man of suffering and acquainted with infirmity; and as one from whom others hide their faces he was despised and we held him of no account. **Isaiah 53: 3**

Dedication of Middleham 'Peal Board' to commemorate fallen bell ringers of WW1

Liz conducted a fine service of dedication for the new peal board, attended by ringers and some parishioners. Following which, the eight peal ringers ascended the tower to commence their peal attempt. At this stage, it's an 'attempt' because if the ringing does not satisfy certain criteria then it cannot officially be called a peal. I won't go into detail, but it has to be continuous and a minimum of 5040 changes. The name of the peal rung was Yorkshire Surprise Major, involved 5058 changes and took 3 hours 2 minutes to ring.

The Secretary needs to be organised, able to make notes and have a good working knowledge of computers. The Secretary will need to comply with Parish's safeguarding and GDPR protocols.

through the themes and topics of the books we read and discuss.



Our aim is for every parent to have the support they need to give their children the best possible start in life. The funding from the Lottery will support our 'Early Start with Additional Needs' Project

The project will support a team of at least 30 trained local volunteers to offer support each year to 50 Richmondshire families with a child aged 7 or under.

We will pay particular attention to supporting families where a child is awaiting assessment for, or has received a diagnosis of, autism and also those with additional needs. It is also important to note that the service is open to all qualifying families, across Richmondshire, including Service families.

The service aims to avert crisis in families by reducing household stress during the critical early years of children's development and, in many cases, where consideration is being given to formal assessment by statutory agencies, including Education and Health. We welcome and indeed receive referrals from many sources including self referrals.

This support will be long-term and non-judgemental. It will help families to feel less isolated, more resilient, and better able to cope. Home-Start Richmondshire has data from families who have been in receipt of our support which shows the positive impact of our work on their ability to cope better with parental and child mental health; reduced feelings of isolation; improved self-esteem; improved ability to access local services; improved family budget and household management and importantly, reduced family conflict.

This award means that our charity will be able to continue to serve and support families across the whole of Richmondshire and we will be advertising to recruit additional volunteers and Trustees to the Board in the very near future.

Restorative practice and listening skills

We are living in challenging times: young people are facing many stressors and threats to their wellbeing. At The Wensleydale school we are committed to Restorative practice which involves "Completely" listening and speaking in a way that lowers levels of emotion and demonstrates the intention to understand. Relationships in our school are built during both teaching and non-teaching interactions, where staff use listening skills to understand the complexities faced by many students in their lives.

Listening and speaking skills to support students

Classrooms where children do not feel a sense of control, safety or attention, can be scary places- not to mention hard work for teaching staff; they are certainly not conducive to teaching or learning. On the other hand, students who feel safe and understood by their teachers and connected to the school community, are more likely to engage in learning tasks and to positively navigate peer relationships. Over the years we have worked hard to develop this sense of belonging and trust. There are some simple listening and speaking skills we use to support our students in these challenging times. We aim to achieve three things:

- **Compassion:** Our care for students and the ways we demonstrate our interest and desire to be helpful.
- **Containment:** Practices we use to manage our own and students' feelings and lower levels of emotional overload.
- Connection: The belief that in school there is someone who can be turned to and trusted.

When we listen to students, our safeguarding responsibilities are foremost in our minds. When we are sure that the content is not a safeguarding issue, we move into listening to "really understanding". "Active listening" describes how we listen with an open mind, without making assumptions or drifting into memories of similar events in our own lives, while offering encouraging signs such as nodding the head, appropriate facial expressions, and short verbal confirmations.

Containment means hearing students' narratives without being overwhelmed, demonstrating to students that their stories are bearable.

Compassionate listening means understanding and caring about the speaker without being impacted by their feelings in a way that makes us less able to help. Listening, understanding and remaining safe in our own head space helps us to be supportive through careful, deliberate and appropriate responses. An example - there may be many potential responses to a student, who upon being given a task, questions "what is the point?". One is to reflect back what you hear: "You can't see the point of this." This response may illicit further clarification from the pupil:

- "Yeah what is the point in anything?"
- "There is no point in school at all."
- "I can't do it and I'm not interested."

Listening can help us to offer a response that fits the underlying beliefs or needs. The first two pupil responses may prompt a further comment from the teacher, perhaps arranging a time when they can tell us a bit more about these feelings. This might, in turn, lead to referral for more support.

The third response above might illicit further explanation from the teacher and a starter such as: "Let's have a look at it together and see how we get on."

Final thoughts

Listening and speaking skills are important in challenging times because they can help to build and maintain relationships, foster a sense of wellbeing, and support learning.

Using well-chosen language can build trust and help to avoid escalation and feelings of isolation. By listening carefully and responding in a way that demonstrates compassion and our desire to make a connection, we can help to create a supportive and inclusive environment for students that promotes wellbeing, safety, and personal development.

Our 100 Club begins again in March, so if you fancy a little flutter each month with an opportunity to win one of three cash prizes, please get in touch, only £12 for the year.


Bird notes from Richard Wells - March 2023

It's the end of the third week in February as I write my notes, and numerous birds are indicating

that spring is just round the corner. In the past few days I have witnessed....

Curlews voicing their distinctive call as they head up onto our moorlands to breed....

Oystercatchers grouping together on the banks of the Ure before pairing up (there were 30 at Jervaulx on Feb 14)....a pair of Mandarin duck heading upstream at the Cover Bridge on the 20th.... and lapwings ca-



vorting in fields as if it were April rather than mid-February.

Sheila Walker has noticed a change too in her garden in Caldbergh with great, blue and coal

tits as well as dunnocks all suddenly much more active.

There is of course still time for the weather to turn back to winter but it all looks encouraging at the moment.

The first of our summer migrants will be arriving in March. Listen out for the distinctive "chiff...chaff, chiff...chaff" call of the chiffchaff if you are out for a woodland walk. Or even your garden, perhaps. There appears to be more of these small greeny-yellow warblers these days, and they could turn up almost anywhere. Even your garden feeders.





These should be followed by sand martins over the Ure. Where the river and Harkers Beck join near Jervaulx is usually a good place to see them, feeding feverishly at the end of their long journey from southern Africa. They will then breed in holes in the river bank.

Biodiversity in the parish Winter Aconites

The golden yellow of the winter aconite can create a stunning display during the often grey and dismal days of the ongoing winter months. They provide a sunny and cheery display — especially when you see them growing next to snowdrops, which they often do.



The winter aconite is not native to the UK (actually native of south west continental Europe) but has been naturalised here. It was first introduced to the Northern part of Europe in the 16th century and became fashionable in the 18th century when landscape gardens became popular. England's famous landscape architect, 'Capability' Brown, liked to include the Winter Aconites in his garden designs so that even in early Spring there would be something flowering in the garden and so something interesting to see.



When you look at the photos you may not find it surprising that the winter aconite is a member of the buttercup family. It especially loves deep deciduous woodland where during the winter months the light can still penetrate to ground level because the leaf canopy hasn't yet grown and begun to shade out the light rays. This means that it is ideal conditions for the winter aconite to thrive.

The flowers reflect UV light, which suggests that they are trying to attract pollinators which can see the UV spectrum. They provide an early source of nectar so winter aconite has an important role in helping insects that emerge before spring has got going.

But beware. This beautiful plant is actually poisonous when ingested by humans, as it contains cardiac glycosides that affect the heart. If ingested in large quantities, it can cause irreparable heart damage. Nevertheless they provide a lovely dose of hope and beauty when the days are still short and chilly.


